

## A Word From Your President and Director



Napa is one of the smallest cities in the country that fields a full scale operatic production each year. Yet our artistic reputation rivals those of some of the larger city operas. Our reputation will be further enhanced this year by reason of the 70 outstanding musicians and artists who are here from many parts of the United States and from abroad, to improve their talents and to achieve something beautiful.

The performers, both singers and dancers, have delighted in today's work, *Doña Francisquita*, which is one of the most remarkable bodies of music ever composed.

The Napa community has overwhelmingly embraced our visiting artists this year by opening their homes to them during the four week workshop. Some 24 Artist Sponsors are involved.

Despite the largely volunteer efforts from the artists themselves, the artist sponsors and many others, these productions are still costly due to the creative stage settings, authentic costuming, musicians, coaches and staging costs. Ticket sales cover about 10% of the total cost leaving the remainder to come from donations and grants. By stretching these donations to the limit we are able to achieve something important in the world of art.

So that our creative work doesn't disappear with its final performance, a professional photography team will record this unique production for the future.

### So, what exactly is a Zarzuela?

The Zarzuela is possibly the best guarded secret in the history of music. This unique genre of musical theater is outstanding in the field of entertainment but rarely presented in fully staged productions in the United States.

One reason that a Zarzuela is difficult to "type" is that there are two distinct forms of Zarzuelas, the short, one-act Zarzuelas which are sometimes associated with comic operas, and the longer full scale productions. Both the short and long works have some things in common, principally the solid base of delightful music mostly derived from Spanish regional folk music, plus the sincere believable, stories they tell.

An excellent introduction to the genre is today's production of *Doña Francisquita*, the masterpiece of the Catalan composer Amadeo Vives (1871-1932) which is musically more sophisticated and dramatically more complex than the majority of Zarzuelas, but also pays homage to the music and milieu normally a part of the shorter ("genero chico") genre.

Derived from its many precursors the Zarzuela, as we know it today, emerged about 1850 and reached its peak at the end of the nineteenth century, very nearly the same time frame as that of Verdi's opera compositions. However many delightful Zarzuela works date later than 1900 some as late as the early 1930's when the Spanish Civil War pretty well marked the end of the classic era of Zarzuela composition.

During the era of composing grand operas, the Spanish composers were actually more prolific than their European counterparts, having composed almost 10,000 works. Of this large number, about three hundred of the most enduring Zarzuelas exist in today's repertory. Three hundred is still a considerable number, considering that 90% of the operatic repertory performed today consists of only 20 different operas, mainly Italian.



# Synopsis

The composer Vives drew the subject for *Doña Francisquita* from a comedy "*La Disereta Enamorada*" by Lope de Vega, one of the great classic Spanish authors.

Vives selected the name for his piece so as to foretell the plot. The name Francisquita would be the name of a young girl. Yet the term Doña is typically used for a married woman. By combining the two names he has implied that the young girl of his story is bound and determined to be married.

The story opens on a square in Madrid. Against a background of peddlers and church goers it introduces the main characters, Fernando the eligible bachelor, Cardona his friend and side kick, Aurora an actress who is Fernando's present love, and Doña Francisquita his future love, plus her mother Francisca.

Fernando can't hide his fascination for the actress Aurora, even though his friend Cardona tells him to forget her and to look instead at Francisquita.

Starting with dropping her handkerchief, Francisquita employs some clever maneuvers designed to capture Fernando's interest. She goes so far as to accept the attentions of Fernando's father, Don Matías, to get the idea across that she is indeed serious about marrying someone. As Francisquita's plans take form, Fernando becomes less and less attracted by Aurora, the actress, to the point that the formerly haughty Aurora openly begs for him, but finally scornfully accepts her defeat in one of the truly beautiful songs of the Zarzuela "Escúchame, Fernando".

The ultimate move by Francisquita is to imply to all concerned that the young Fernando is romantically interested in her widowed Mother. When Fernando's father, Don Matías, hears of this he ridicules the notion of an older woman marrying his young son. In an about face he has to concede that it was foolish of him to attempt to marry Francisquita essentially taking her away from his son. The beautiful closing song, "The Joy of Youth", symbolizes the triumph of the young couple.

In many respects the work is rich in memorable tunes for the singers and in danceable music for the dazzling choreography.

## Directors

### Daniel Helfgot - Stage Director



Mr. Helfgot returns to the Jarvis Conservatory for his fourth season of directing. His credits include productions in Germany, Argentina, Mexico, Canada, and the US. His repertoire of over 150 productions spans from the Baroque to Mozart; the Bel Canto to Verdi, Wagner, and Puccini; as well as the 20th Century, including several world premieres. Mr. Helfgot is the author of the libretto for the opera *The Tale of the Nutcracker* which premiered in 1999. He is the

which premiered in 1999. He is the author of the book *The Third Line: The Opera Performer as Interpreter*, published by Schirmer Books. Mr. Helfgot teaches and lectures on Acting Techniques for conservatories in Boston, Buenos Aires and Napa. He is currently the Director of the Opera Department at the University of Missouri in Kansas City.

### Mario la Vega - Choreographer



Born in Córdoba, Spain, Mario La Vega initiated his career as a flamence guitarist, later becoming a renowned dancer. Along with Maria del Sol his wife, he founded the Spanish Anthology Ballet with choregoraphy by Maestro Alberto Lorca. This ballet was eventually absorbed by the Spanish Minister of Culture as an embryo of today's Spanish National Ballet. Mr. La Vega joined José Tamayo culminating in the presentation, along with Maria del Sol, of *Doña Francisquita* with Alfredo Krauss. His

most recent work is with a Carlos Saura film Buñuel, Lorca and Dali.

### Donna Roll - Master Coach



Ms. Roll brings her experience as an internationally known soprano. She has appeared in opera, oratorio and recital in Europe, the former Soviet Union and throughout the U.S., performing with the symphonies of Rochester, Dallas, San Antonio, Houston, Baltimore, Kansas City, Seattle, San Francisco, Milwaukee, Oregon, Virginia, Mississippi and Vancouver. She is the Director of Opera at Longy and was a faculty member for over a decade at the

### Maria del Sol - Choreographer



Born in Laredo, Santander, Spain, Marie del Sol has been dancing since an early age. She started her career in the film industry, acting with renowned Spanish actors. She founded the Spanish Anthology Ballet with Mario la Vega that was to become the pioneer of today's Spanish National Ballet. Later on she joined La Compañia Lirica Nacional in the Zarzuela Theater with José Tamayo. She traveled with her Spanish Anthology Ballet around the world, with Choregorapher Alberto

Lorca again joining Mr. Tamayo and his Zarzuela in a collaboration of 15 years. Her last presentation of *Doña Francisquita* was with Alfredo Krauss. §

### Dr. John Ballerino - Voice Coach/Repétiteur



Dr. Ballerino returns to the Jarvis Conservatory for his third season as Voice Coach/Repétiteur. He is the Faculty Vocal Coach and Piano Teacher at Chapman University. He has lectured on Spanish and Latin-American Music and has led Zarzuela chamber and vocal recitals since 1995. Dr. Ballerino has acted as Vocal Coach and Repétiteur for productions including UCLA Opera's Romeo and Juliet, Opera A La Carte's The Mikado and HMS Pinafore, Madame Butterfly, La Traviata, Nozze di

Figaro and an upcoming Carmen at Opera Santa Barbara, as well as for USC Opera Program, Opera Works, and Guild Opera of Los Angeles. He coaches in German, French and Italian, and is fluent in Spanish.
